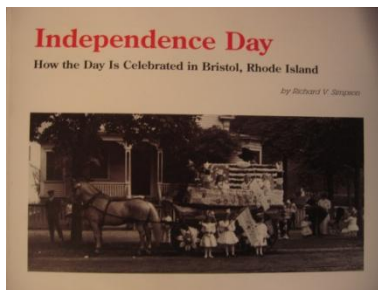

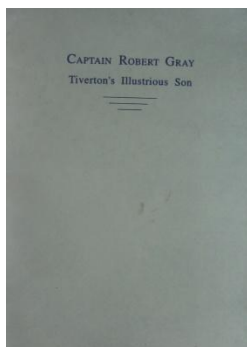

BOOKS



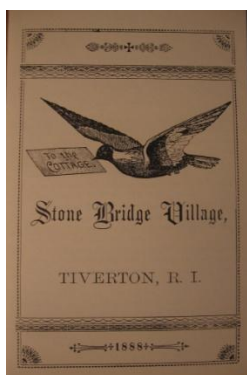
Independence Day: How the Day Is Celebrated in Bristol, Rhode Island by Richard V. Simpson, 1989; 176 pages, paperback. **\$3.**

A historical synopsis of the Bristol Independence Day Parade and other events with text and photographs dating from the nineteenth century to the twentieth, covering 200 years of celebrations. Includes lists of Chief Marshals, Speakers of the Day, Committee Chairmen, Miss Fourths, and Navy Vessels, as well as excerpts from newspapers. Find out when the celebration was a “dry” one, with lectures on the evils of drink (no, it wasn’t during prohibition – it was in the 1800’s!). What was the first year a passenger train ran from Providence to Bristol on July 4th? The answer is in this book. What was the great bonfire controversy? Read and find out! There’s even a chapter on “That Old Demon Rum” and another on “Baseball on The Common”.



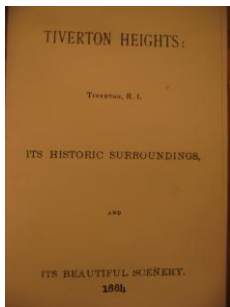
Captain Robert Gray: Tiverton's Illustrious Son* by Felix G. Davis, 1945; reprint 1993, 16 pages, paperback. **\$3.

A brief biography highlighting Captain Robert Gray’s genealogy, his role during the American Revolution, and his explorations after the war. He was the first American to circumnavigate the globe, and discovered the Columbia River, naming it after his ship. It was due to this latter discovery that aided Lewis & Clark to further explore the Northwest Passage. Details of his sea voyages from Cape Verde around the Horn to what is now the Pacific Northwest describe of how a Cape Verdean boy on his ship met his death at the hands of unfriendly natives. Port of calls to the Hawaiian Islands and China are also related in Gray’s trade routes.



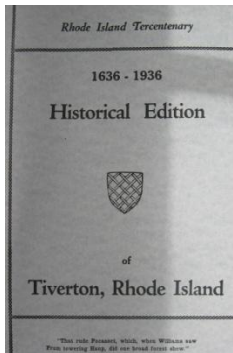
Stone Bridge Village, Tiverton, R.I.*; reprint of an 1888 booklet, 16 pages, paperback. **\$3.

An entertaining description of Stone Bridge Village, the area encompassing the lower part of Lawton Avenue. Descriptions of the buildings under construction where the Lawton House formerly stood, the railroad, Whitridge Hall, the houses on Nanaquaket, the ships used during the Revolution, Little Compton, Rhode Island (a.k.a. Aquidneck Island), Fall River and its “steamers” are highlighted so that today’s reader is taken back to that Victorian time in Tiverton.



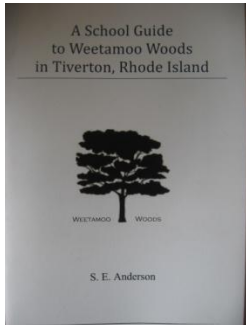
Tiverton Heights: Tiverton, R. I. Its Historic Surroundings and Its Beautiful Scenery*, reprint of an 1884 booklet, 19 pages, paperback. **\$3.

Written from a first-person perspective, this is an enlightening text, documenting who lived where and who purchased what on Tiverton Heights (Highland Road area) and its surrounding neighborhood near Stone Bridge. The history of its part in the American Revolution and the Seaconnet River (as it is spelled in the book) are also detailed. It ends with “The ‘Stone Bridge House’ will open on Monday, May 26, or Monday, June 2d, 1884.” Alas, this Tiverton landmark is long gone from the last century, but lives on in this historic tale.



Rhode Island Tercentenary 1636-1936 Historical Edition of Tiverton, Rhode Island* compiled by Grace Stafford Durfee, 1936; reprint 1995, 78 pages, paperback. **\$3.

A combination of histories about Tiverton, its people, culture, and industries. The first chapter describes its beginnings in 1637 with the English colonists and the local natives, the Town’s inhabitants and their part in King Phillip’s War and the Revolutionary War with the Battle of Rhode Island. Other chapters describe the early ferries, churches, schools, libraries, Town government, and industries, accompanied by black and white photographs. The last part of the book highlights historic spots and houses in Tiverton. Get this book to find out “where [fill in the blank] used to be”!



A School Guide to Weetamoo Woods in Tiverton, Rhode Island* by S. E. Anderson, 2013. 39 pages, paperback in Ziploc bag. **\$10.

The title is misleading, as it is a guide for anyone interested in the history and flora of Weetamoo Woods. Starting at the East Road entrance to Weetamoo Woods, it takes the reader along a trail past Scipio Cook’s cellar hole, High Rock, and the sawmill ruins, relating interesting facts on the history of the area and sites along the way. Color photographs of each plant specified in the book and where to locate them on the trail allow both the novice and the experienced Weetamoo Woods walker to easily find them as they walk the historic woods. A must have for those wanting to know what they’re seeing in the woods!

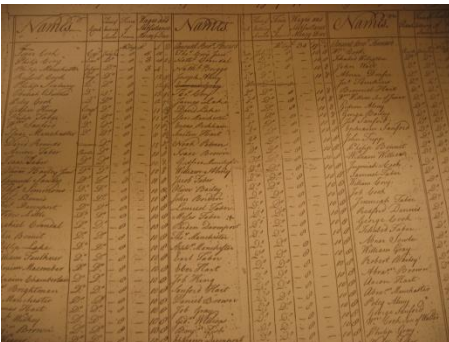

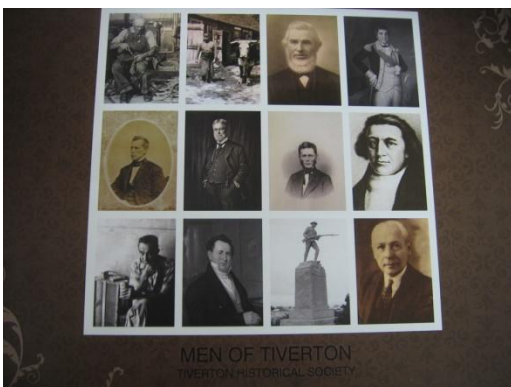
